Herz, Gregory Scholarship: Update and Deadline for Applications

One of the highlights of our annual NMPW conference comes when we award scholarships to college students. Two \$750 *Doris Gregory* scholarships will be awarded to selected students currently studying across the spectrum of communication and journalism. Due to the generosity of friends who contributed to a special fund in memory of our dear member *Cary Herz*, we will also present a \$2,500 scholarship to a photojournalism student.

This year's endeavor will be especially meaningful as we honor Cary and assist students who face some particularly trying times.

The main criteria for NMPW scholarship awards are career potential and financial need, although scholastic standing is a consideration. Students must be New Mexico residents enrolled at/attending a Post-Secondary/Higher Education institution. Applicants are required to send samples of their work, proof of financial need, an academic transcript, a letter of recommendation, a letter of intent with career goals and the application form.

Awards will be presented to the winners of the *New Mexico Press Women's 2009 Communication Contest*, the *High School Communications Contest* and the *Zia Award* on April 18th at the NMPW Annual Conference and Banquet in Santa Fe. Good luck to all who entered these prestigious competitions.

The *Communications Award* recognizes excellence in print or electronic media, photography, advertising, public relations, graphic arts and academic journalism in New Mexico.

The *High School Communications Award* is part of the National Federation of Press Women (NFPW) High School Communications Contest. It inspires students to do their best work, which earns them recognition and reflects well on their teachers/advisers. The National Association of Secondary School Principals has placed the contest on its "NASSP National Advisory List of Contests and Activities," which can be found on the Web site, www.nassp.org.

Students enter work in one of 14 categories: Editorial, Opinion, News Story, Feature Story, Sports Story, Columns, Feature Photo, Sports Photo, Cartooning, Review, Graphics, Single-Page Layout, Double-Truck Layout and Environment.

First place winners continue to the NFPW High School Communications Contest and will compete with students from all over the country in their respective categories. Professional journalists judge all New Mexico entries and provide written comments on the work, which are returned to the students. All first place, second place, third place and honorable mentions receive certificates.

The **Zia Award** honors an outstanding New Mexican writer. In 2009 it is designated for a writer of non-fiction.
