Annual Conference Wrap-Up

An April snowstorm greeted conference attendees who began arriving at the annual conference in Santa Fe late in the afternoon of Friday, April 18. By Saturday morning the weather was bright and the conference was underway! Following are some highlights from NMPW members.

• **NMPW President Carol Clark** had this to say: “I felt pride engulf me as a Zia Award winner described how impressed she was by the ‘caliber’ and ‘welcoming kindness’ of NMPW members she met at the conference. It just doesn’t get much better than that.”

• **Sandy Schauer:** “Being able to network with so many people in one day always makes me feel like I am not alone in what I do. I think about the people I’ve spoken with often after it is over and get on with what I need to accomplish.”

• **Cheryl Fallstead:** “As usual, the NMPW conference provided great opportunities to network with peers who can provide career input and guidance. The workshops on using social networking Web sites and blogs to support our other forms of media have inspired me to create sites for Explore New Mexico!”

• **R. Thomas Berner** learned something new at the April conference. He writes: “As a fairly new blogger, I was pleased to learn that there is a free program called Google Analytics that one can add to his blog and count visitors. It’s not that hard to install. How to find it? Well, just Google ‘Google Analytics’. Tell ’em Tom sent you.”

• **Denise Tessier** wraps it up with: “We’ve had a couple of confer-

ences where suddenly an unintentional harmonic convergence occurred, where an unanticipated theme just showed up, the kind that gives you goose bumps when it unfolds. It happened in Ruidoso years ago (remind me and I’ll write about that sometime). And it happened again this year.

“After we’d just heard Diana Washington Valdez talk about the hundreds of women who’ve been abducted, horribly abused, murdered and buried in the “killing fields” of Juarez and other parts of Mexico, author Paula Moore acquainted us over lunch with the subject of her book that won our

Zia Award. “Cricket in the Web” focused on the life and death of a teenaged girl who was brutalized and treated like a plaything by men, abducted, murdered and buried in the desert. Except this was in Las Cruces. In 1949.

“And just as has occurred with the Mexican murders, many men emerged as suspects, but none was held accountable for her death. It gave me the chills to hear Moore take us into the life of young Cricket Coogler and the simple events that occurred on the day she disappeared. These two author/investigators – Valdez and Moore – have honored these women by keeping them in our memory. And in a way, our conference ended up honoring them, too.”

Zia Award Luncheon Honors Six Standouts

A New Mexico publisher and five New Mexican women were honored at the annual Zia Award luncheon last month for their outstanding contributions in the 2009 contest, which focused on nonfiction.

The Zia Book Award went to **Paula Moore** for “Cricket in the Web.” Three years of intense research and interviews went into her book, subtitled “The 1949 Unsolved Murder that Unraveled Politics in New Mexico.” Other award-winning book, author Moore says, “I believe the book covers the most notorious unsolved New Mexico murder in the 20th century – the most notorious of the 19th century being the murders of Col. Albert Fountain and his young son Henry in 1896, another case that still triggers heated debate in Dona Ana County as well.”

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Biggest Ever Scholarships Awarded

The mood was festive at the banquet on Saturday night, as the biggest ever scholarships were awarded to a deserving few.

The Cary Herz Photojournalism Scholarship, in the amount of \$2500, was awarded to **Vanessa Sanchez**, whose soft, stark photography speaks volumes – just as great photojournalism should.

“Photojournalism gives me the opportunity to give back to my community and to capture moments in time to share with others,” Sanchez says.

The UNM junior with a 3.8 grade point average plans to complete her bachelor’s degree in intercultural communication so she can become an advocate for change in New Mexico. A renowned photographer who followed a similar path has the highest praise for her work. “Vanessa has taken several courses with me, in both photojournalism and intercultural ethnography,” writes professor and photographer Miguel Gandert. “She has an excellent background in scholarly fieldwork as well as journalism. Granting this scholarship to Vanessa will do wonders to help this gifted young woman.”

The Photojournalism Scholarship is given in honor of famed photographer Cary Herz, the 2008 National Federation of Press Women Communicator of Achievement and a pioneer in the field of ethnographic photography.

Zia Award Chair Jessica Savage honored **University of New Mexico Press** with a certificate for submitting the top honoree all three years of her term as chair. A three-year term covers the three rotating genres of fiction, children’s literature and nonfiction.

NMPW High School Contest Results

The NMPW High School Contest had a total of 175 entries this year, up from last year’s 134. This included 73 entries from Sandia Prep, 44 from Sandia High School, 24 from Highland High School, 10 from Hobbs High School and 10 from Los Lunas High School. Albuquerque Academy and La Cueva High School, big winners last year, did not enter this year.

As would be expected with the large number of Sandia Prep entries, that school had the most first place winners. Sandia Prep came in first in these categories: Columns, Feature Photo, Sports Photo, Layout Single Page, News, Feature Story and Review. Sandia High School had first place winners in Double Truck Layout, Editorial and Cartoon. Los Lunas High School had a first place in Graphics. Contest Chair Chris Burroughs mailed all first place winners to the national competition, along with a check for \$130 so they could participate in the national youth competition.

• Sandia Prep: 18 second places, seven third places and 19 honorable mentions.

• Los Lunas High School: one second place; one third place and three honorable mentions.

• Hobbs High School: one second place, one third place and six honorable mentions.

Connie Gotsch publishes her latest book!



“Belle’s Star,” a youth novel by Farmington, N.M. author Connie Gotsch, will be officially released Aug. 11 in Albuquerque by Artemesia Publishers. Book signings are in the planning stages for mid-July.

Written from a dog’s point of view and illustrated by Farmington artist, John Cogan, “Belle’s Star” empowers children ages 8-12 to build new lives after escaping bullying and abuse or other difficult situations.

Darcy, a spunky soccer playing girl, and her Aunt Ellen rescue Belle from abusive owners and offer her love. Belle has never met a kind human. Living with Darcy terrifies her. Other people and animals, including a cat, teach her about trust. Her adventures with these colorful characters help kids face painful issues.

Award winning journalist and retired Farmington elementary school

counselor Margaret Cheasebro has designed an activities booklet for Belle’s Star. The booklet will be available in downloadable form upon purchase of the novel.

The guide can assist in small group counseling and classroom sessions designed to help elementary school students understand abuse and deal with it.
